TO MAKE FURTHER PROVISION WITH REGARD TO THE LAW RELATING
TO ALIENS.

1. This Law may be cited as the Aliens Law, 1921. Short title.
2. No alien shall hold a pilot licence in Cyprus. Pilot licence.
3. After the passing of this Law no alien shall be appointed to any office or place in the Civil Service of Cyprus. Cyprus
Civil Service
- 4.—(1.) An alien coming from outside Cyprus shall not land in Cyprus except with the leave of an immigration officer. Admission
of aliens.
 - (2.) Leave shall not be given to an alien to land in Cyprus unless he complies with the following conditions, that is to say:—
 - (a.) He is in a position to support himself and his dependents;
 - (b.) He is not a lunatic, idiot, or mentally deficient;
 - (c.) He is not the subject of a certificate given to the immigration officer by a medical inspector that for medical reasons it is undesirable that the alien should be permitted to land;
 - (d.) He has not been sentenced in a foreign country for any crime which would be a ground for extradition from Cyprus;
 - (e.) He is not the subject of a deportation order in force under this Law or any other Law; or
 - (f.) He has not been prohibited from landing by the High Commissioner.
- 5.—(1.) The High Commissioner, with the previous approval of the Secretary of State, may if he deems it to be conducive to the public good make an order (hereinafter referred to as a deportation order) requiring an alien to leave and remain out of Cyprus. Deportation
order
 - (2.) An order made under this section may be made subject to any condition which the High Commissioner may think proper.
 - (3.) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made shall leave Cyprus in accordance with the order, and shall thereafter so long as the order is in force remain out of Cyprus.

(4.) An alien with respect to whom a deportation order is made may be detained in such manner as may be directed by the High Commissioner and may be placed on a ship about to leave Cyprus and shall be deemed to be in legal custody whilst so detained, and until the ship finally leaves Cyprus.

(5.) The master of a ship about to call at any port outside Cyprus shall, if so required by the High Commissioner, or by an immigration officer, receive an alien against whom a deportation order has been made, and his dependents, if any, on board the ship, and afford him and them a passage to that port and proper accommodation and maintenance during the passage.

Saving for
diplomatic
persons, etc.

6. Nothing in this Law contained shall be construed as imposing any restriction or disability on any duly accredited head of a foreign diplomatic mission or any member of his official staff or household.

Offences and
penalties.

7.—(1.) If any person acts in contravention of or fails to comply with the provisions of this Law or any order made thereunder, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Law.

(2.) If any person aids or abets any person in any contravention of this Law, or knowingly harbours any person whom he knows or has reasonable ground for believing to have acted in contravention of this Law, he shall be guilty of an offence against this Law.

(3.) Where a person lands in Cyprus in contravention of this Law the master of the ship or the pilot or commander of the aircraft from which he lands shall, unless he proves to the contrary, be deemed to have aided and abetted the offence.

(4.) A person who is guilty of an offence against this Law shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding six months, or, on a second or subsequent conviction, twelve months, or, in either case, to both such fine and imprisonment.
