For the Appointment of a Magistrate to have Jurisdiction in the Military Camp at Troodos and in its Vicinity.

Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Troodos Camp Magistrate Law.

Power to appoint magistrate for camp at Troodos.

2. The Governor may from time to time appoint a fit person to be a magistrate to exercise magisterial jurisdiction within the boundaries of the military camp at Troodos and within such limits outside the military camp as he shall from time to time direct.

Jurisdiction.

**3.** The magistrate shall, within the limits of his jurisdiction, have and exercise all the powers of a magistrate under the Courts of Justice Law.

Cap. 8. the Courts of Justice Law.

Every decision of the magistrate sha

Every decision of the magistrate shall be subject to appeal in the same manner and to the same extent as if it were the decision of a magistrate.

Sittings.

**4.** The sittings of the magistrate shall be held at such place within the camp, and at such times, as the Officer Commanding the troops for the time being shall approve.

Detention of persons charged.

5. Persons charged with offences before the magistrate may be detained in such place within the camp as the Officer Commanding the troops may direct, and may be

kept in custody either by a peace officer or by a military guard on duty within the camp:

Provided always that no person shall be so detained for more than twenty-four hours before he is brought before the magistrate, and no person shall be so detained on remand for more than three days.

6. Every commitment upon summary conviction by a Commitmagistrate appointed under this Law shall be to the prison at Limassol.

7. Nothing in this Law contained shall be held to derogate Jurisdiction from or to affect in any way the jurisdiction of any District Courts not Court already existing in the Colony.

8. The Governor with the advice and assistance of the Chief Justice may from time to time, by writing under the hand and official seal of the Governor and the hand of the Chief Justice, make Rules of Court to regulate the practice and procedure of the magistrate having jurisdiction under this Law.
